Council directed staff to investigate the potential for residents to keep backyard chickens in November 2019 Council received staff's Hen Registration Trial Program Report at their meeting in June 2020 Staff are soliciting feedback at this public meeting and through an on-line survey during September 2020





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Summary

- 3 year trial program
- Maximum 2 hens that are at least 4 months old
- Maximum 30 permits issued on first come first served basis
- The trial program ends December 31, 2023, therefore the issuing of a permit beyond this date is subject to the evaluation of the program by Council and passing an amending by-law to continue the program



Administration – Application, Fee and Inspection

- Application and renewal fee \$110.00
- The applicant must reside on the property where the hens are kept
- If the applicant is not the property owner, authorization must be obtained from the property owner



Hen Coop Location

• Rear yard only

- One hen coop permitted per residential lot
- 3 m from lot line
- 5 m from any catch basin



Hen Coop Size Requirements

- Maximum size of 9 m²
- Maximum height of 2.1 m
- Minimum floor area of 0.37 m² for each hen
- Minimum outdoor enclosure area of 0.92 m² for each hen



Hen Coop Construction

- Hen coops shall be constructed to:
 - prevent the entry of rodents and predators;
 - contain lockable roofs and doors;
 - provide flooring that is resistant to moisture and mold, is lined with shavings, straw, or other appropriate materials to absorb manure and facilitate cleaning;
 - provide a perch area sufficient to accommodate all hens;
 - provide a nest box and an accessible dust bath area



Hen Coop General Requirements

- Maintain hen coop in a clean condition at all times, to prevent obnoxious odours and vermin
- Remove feces daily from hen coop and deposit in a secured waste receptacle or composter
- Waste receptacles or composters shall be stored in the rear yard at least 3m from any lot line and emptied regularly
- Hens shall be kept in a fully enclosed hen coop at all times
- Hen coop roof and door is to be locked between 9 pm and 6 am



General Requirements

- Hens shall be fed in a manner to minimize the attraction of rodents and other animals
- Feed shall be kept in rodent proof containers and secured at all times to prevent entry of rodents and other animals
- Sale of eggs, manure, meat or other products associated with the keeping of hens is prohibited
- Home slaughter is prohibited
- Roosters are prohibited
- Deceased hens shall be disposed of at a livestock facility, through a veterinarian or facility approved by the applicable Ministry

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Mayor Brown, members of Council, Fellow Citizens, good evening! Regarding the Hen Trial Program, and by-law amendment, which Orangeville staff have carefully crafted, I applaud the effort by all to ensure a fair shake at the egg.

I believe that the pilot covers all of the bases needed to assess the best practices required from our town and residents to see Backyard Hen Keeping become a successful long term initiative for food security and social well-being.

The concerns I perceived from fellow citizens were the keeping of roosters and the slaughtering of hens, which the pilot program and by-law prohibit. As outlined in the by-law, coop and cleanliness requirements define the standard of animal welfare required of those residents interested in participating in the trial.

Further, for those residents interested in exploring keeping hens, a three-year pilot term to keep two hens per household on lots outside the Wellhead Protection Area is a welcome and fair approach. This pilot allows neighbours and residents to keenly observe that hens can happily live inside our town limits.

I know many people in Orangeville who would like to see lawful hen keeping come to fruition, and I am thankful - and want to acknowledge, the fine work by staff on the strong outline for the pilot program.

I am excited to have the council ratify the proposed amendment to the hen by-law so that residents such as myself can legally engage in a shortened, meaningful food system. Keeping backyard hens is an invaluable opportunity for our children to connect to their food sources and learn that reducing the miles we put on our plate dramatically impacts the world.
